

In today's digitally fuelled times, electronic gadgets and mobile phones have become an integral part of our lives. Children especially are increasingly using these devices for entertainment, education and communication.

While they provide numerous benefits to children, there are some risks associated with their use.

As a parent or caregiver, the appropriate steps must be taken to ensure the safety of children while using these devices.

Here are some key points parents and kids need to know about online safety, security and privacy.

# THE INTERNET IS HERE TO STAY

Photos, videos and words kids post on social sites today can stay with them for years to come. So it's important to educate your children about being smart when posting online and to think before they do it.

Once something is on a social networking site, or shared with a third party, don't be surprised if it ends up on the wider web even if you didn't intend it to.

Also, even if postings are deleted it doesn't necessarily mean it's gone for good.

# **SCAMS**

Phishers send emails that look like legitimate correspondence and rely on you to give up personal information like usernames and passwords so they can commit follow-up attacks on your accounts.

Educate your children so they aren't unwittingly volunteering information to a hacker by clicking a malicious link in an ingame chat box or opening an email attachment and falling prey to a phishing attack

# **USE PARENTAL CONTROLS**

Most electronic gadgets and mobile phones come with built-in parental controls that allow you to limit access to certain apps, websites, or content. However, they are not always automatically switched on, so be sure to check with your provider.

Take advantage of these features to keep your child safe and monitor their usage. They also let you set limits on how long a child can spend on their device and even allow you to monitor exactly how they're using it.

You can also look to filter explicit Google search results using SafeSearch. SafeSearch allows you to determine what sites your child



can access with their smartphone, tablet or laptop. It's turned on by default for children under 13 signed into an account managed with the Family Link app. For these accounts, only parents can turn off SafeSearch.

# **ASK TO BUY**

There have been many horror stories recently where children are completing in-gaming purchases without permission and parents are left with a huge bill at the end of the month. Amid the cost-of-living crisis, parents can't afford for their children to make this mistake

The best way to prevent this is to change the settings for in-app purchases. You could disable or password-protect them.

# **LOCATION SHARING**

Location services are used by apps and websites to help tailor experiences to where users are at any given moment.

To prevent sharing this data, it's a good idea to switch off this feature. Instead, there are apps and widgets parents can use so they only have access to this information.

# PHONE SECURITY

By teaching children security measures now, it will help keep their devices secure in the long run.

# **MEASURES INCLUDE:**

- x Don't connect to public wi-fi where possible as it may give hackers access to the child's phone and information
- x Don't share passwords with friends or strangers
- x Don't overshare online
- $\square$ Keep their phone close in their bags on hand rather than leaving it in their back pockets or places where it can be stolen
- $\square$ Password protect the phone so that if it's stolen, personal information can't be easily accessed

# Kids as young as 6 are at risk of gaming addictions, as parents admit it keeps them quiet.

In the digital age, video games have become a ubiquitous part of our cultural landscape, offering not only a source of entertainment but also a platform for social interaction and learning. However, it is crucial to shed light on the lessdiscussed aspects of gaming, particularly its impact on the younger generation.

# The Allure of the Virtual World:

Video games offer an escape, a chance to live in a world where the rules are different, the challenges are surmountable, and the rewards are immediate. For children, this world is not just an escape but a canvas of imagination. However, this allure, if left unchecked, can lead to a disconnection from reality. # Social Implications:

While video games can offer a platform for social interaction, it's a double-edged sword. Cyberbullying, exposure to inappropriate content, and online predation are real risks in the online gaming community. The anonymity and distance that the digital world offers can lead to behaviours and interactions that might be unacceptable in the real world. For children, who are still learning to navigate social contexts, these negative experiences can have profound impacts on their development and wellbeing.

# The Physical Toll:


Long hours spent in front of screens can lead to a sedentary lifestyle, contributing to the rise of obesity, vision problems, and other physical health issues. The immediate gratification that video games offer can also lead to impulsive behaviour patterns, affecting a child's ability to engage in delayed gratification - a key skill for personal development.





# 1. Make space for their new toys by getting rid of the old ones

Decluttering your children's current toys and downsizing them will help you to make space for the new toys they recieved this Christmas. # 3. Store and organise the wanted tovs

# //// World Museum

This month Dave Roberts, Learning and Participation Facilitator and in house dinosaur expert and enthusiast at World Museum dives into the amazing world of Dinosaurs.

## Are dinosaurs real?

Some people cannot believe that dinosaurs could ever be real, but fossils (preserved remains of once living things) prove that these animals did indeed exist. You can see some of these fossils at our museum.

# How did dinosaurs live?

Dinosaurs lived and behaved like most animals that are alive today. We now believe them to be very birdlike, so they would make nests and lay eggs. What is amazing is how fast they grew. A baby Tyrannosaur would be about the size of a loaf of bread when it hatched.

By the time it was thirteen years old it would be the size of an adult human being. Then it had a growth spurt, from age thirteen to sixteen, and would reach full size at 12 meters

floor!

We can work out what some dinosaurs ate as we have coprolite fossils from dinosaurs, that's fossilised dinosaur poo - check out our dino droppings in our gallery on the fourth

long and around 6 tons, that's the same weight as a fully grown African elephant!

# When did dinosaurs live?

Dinosaurs first appeared around 220 million years ago and the giant ones became extinct 65 million years ago, however as birds are now considered to be dinosaurs, you could say they still exist now.

# Where did dinosaurs live?

Dinosaur fossils are found all over the world. even Antarctica. There are lots of different prehistoric animals that lived at the same time as the dinosaurs such as Pterosaurs, Pleisiosaurs. Mososaurs but the animals we call dinosaurs were all animals of dry land. This means that the rocks that have fossils are ones formed on land and not the sea. Most of the famous dinosaurs like Tyrannosaurus rex are from North America.





# How do you put the dinosaurs together at the museum?

Dinosaur fossils are very, very rare. Even rarer are whole skeletons, we mostly find odd bits like a leg or a few ribs. It takes many years of carefully removing the fossils from the rocks, in laboratories. If we have enough from different individual dinosaurs of the same species we can work out what the missing bits are that make up the whole skeleton. For museums around the world to have dinosaur displays we need to make copies of these fossil skeletons, in materials lighter than the stone fossils. This is usually plaster or plastic and then fitted around a metal or wire to show the skeleton as you see it in the museum.
